Bruce Levett CEO Health Consumers Tasmania (HCT) joined the meeting by Zoom.	
The CCLR members introduced themselves to Bruce, Judi explained to Bruce the different categories represented by the Roundtable in the absence of other members.	
He introduced Roundtable members to HCT, and discussed the Government's 2021 Election Commitment for HCT to auspice three Community Health and Wellbeing Networks in Ulverstone, Scottsdale and Huonville. Judi declared her involvement with HCT as Chair of the Board.

The Central – a learning, careers and wellbeing hub for the Central Coast	
Glen gave an update on the proposal to Central Coast Council for lease of the current Visitor Information Centre site. Shane and Mel attended a Central Coast Council workshop 31/05, to present the proposal. Hopeful for a partnership with Council not just a lease. Initial interest has been shown. This could be a good venue for USC @ the Clock, UTAS, TasTAFE, and other visiting services usually based in Devonport or Burnie. Volunteering Tas, University of the Third Age and employment agencies were also suggested by the group.	
USC also have the lease of the Clock site until December 2022, which could be utilised along side the visitor information centre.	
Central Coast Council are undertaking due process, including obtaining a property evaluation. They will keep in contact as things progress.
